Children will learn that people today live in different types of homes and consider why this is. Children will observe and identify the external features common to all homes. Use simple fieldwork and observational skills to study key human and physical features of their homes and surrounding environment and how they have changed over time. Specific historical and/or geographical features of our locality (George Eliot) Range of household objects used in cleaning, cooking and communication over the past 150 years. How homes changed over time and how they differ between rich and poor (Celtic Round Houses, Saxon houses, Viking houses, Tudor houses, Georgian houses, Victorian houses) Compare two homes from different time periods, identifying similarities and differences. Traditional homes from around the world (African, Asian, German, French, Thai and Russian).	Terraced, semi-detached, detached House, bungalow, flat, apartment, maisonette, cottage. Round house.
