

Attendance

Attendance up to Friday 25th March is 92.64%. The school target is 97%.

Could we please remind you that children must be in school by 8.55 am. School gates open at 8.30 am and class doors open from 8.45 am to 8.55 am for Reception through to Year 6. Please ensure your child arrives on time for school. Increasingly more and more children are late into their classrooms and this impacts not only on your child's learning, but all the other children in that class and the staff teaching the class. **Your child's progress academically as well as socially is our shared priority.**

Children who are late after the doors have closed, will have to come into school via the Office, they will be signed in on our inventory system and that will go down as a late mark. If your child is more than 15 minutes late, then this is classed as an unauthorised absence from school and will impact on their attendance.

If your child is absent from school, can you please ensure you telephone the school office to report their absence and the reason why, daily. If we do not hear from you or we can not contact you, we will telephone your 2nd and 3rd emergency contact.

Early Collection Time

The school day ends at 3.15 pm. Please can we ask that you collect your child from the playground at this time.

Early collections will only be permitted for a valid reason ie, medical appointment or prior agreement from the Head. Noticeably, more children are being collected at an earlier time, for no valid reason, which causes disruption in the class room. We would appreciate your co-operation to this matter.



Does your child know our golden rules off by heart yet?

If not, please practise with them at home. Our golden rules apply to everyone at St Paul's - adults as well as children!


We are hoping that our clear rules will make it easy for staff to talk to the children about good behaviour choices. Our behaviour policy stresses the importance of relationships and when rules are not followed, it is the relationship breakdown that we are most concerned about. In a nutshell, our policy is not about blaming people; it is about restoring relationships and taking responsibility for our actions.

Staff Book Choice – Mrs Howard

As this year we are celebrating 25 years of Harry Potter magic, I thought for my book review I would share my favourite book from the series which is Harry Potter and the Goblet of Fire.

Nursery

We have been very busy In Nursery, as we have been learning all about growing and planting, where our food comes from, healthy eating & diet, living things and habitats and we will be learning all about Easter in the coming weeks.

To help us to find out more about planting and growing, all the children had the opportunity to plant their own bean. The children were really excited to do this as they had been reading Jack and the Beanstalk during the week and they all wanted to grow the tallest beanstalk.



We have had a great time celebrating Holi by covering each other in different coloured paints.

We have also prepared for Mother's Day by designing and creating our own cards and flower pictures as gifts. We are also hosting a Mother's Day afternoon tea, where parents/guardians can attend to have a drink and cake whilst the Nursery children sing Mother's Day songs.



We have been exploring our favourite five books which are: Oi Frog, Oh Dear, Peace at last, The crunching munching caterpillar and Tiddler. We have enjoyed exploring these books whilst discussing different story plots within.

Reception

We have been artists and scientists this month. We have been learning about the artist Vincent Van Gogh and recreating his famous artwork 'Sunflowers.' We have been scientists and learning about plants - parts of plant and what they need to grow.

We have also been on a Spring walk and looked for signs of Spring.



Year 1

Our history topic is all about flight and we are exploring the big question 'What if there were no aeroplanes?' The children have investigated the Wright Brothers; looked at the first aeroplane and flight; how flight and aeroplanes have changed, and put all their findings into a time line. Furthermore, we have learnt about how far we can travel with planes, including the first passenger flight, the first international flight, the first cross Atlantic flight, the first nonstop flight around the world. In art the children have learnt a lot about different styles of lines: wavy, diagonal, vertical, horizontal, cross hatch, broken lines.

We have also looked at primary colours and how to mix them into secondary colours.

During our indoor P.E. lessons, the children have enjoyed different types of music, such as salsa, tango and the waltz and explored some ways of moving to their rhythms. Our outdoor P.E. lessons have been weather depending, but last week we could finally start practicing our rolling, throwing and catching ball skills, which the children thoroughly enjoyed.

As scientists, we have had a busy month. We are currently taking part in a bridge building competition. The children have explored different types of paper, tried out which paper and what structure might be the best one to build a bridge out of paper that can span over a 50 cm gap, holding as much weight as possible. Additionally, during science week we enjoyed some different short science experiments.

In R.E. the children are diving into the Easter story. We have enjoyed an interactive Easter labyrinth so far, played a round of Easter pass the parcel and made connections between Easter eggs, the meaning of new life and Salvation. Why don't you ask your child to tell you the story about Easter?

As mathematicians, the children have worked with numbers within 50. They have counted to and back from 50, found less and more than a number within 50, compared objects and are learning how to order sequences of numbers within 50.

During our PSHE lessons, we have looked at healthy living and healthy choices, such as what good foods are, what hygiene is, that plenty of sleep and outdoor activities are healthy choices.



Year 2

We have been diving into our new topic learning about India, comparing it to the UK using our geographical knowledge about human and physical features. So far we have been fascinated by the amazing buildings that they have for places of worship including the Golden Temple and the Taj Mahal.

In English we have been working hard on phonics and lots of us have studied the book 'Princess Blankets' by Carol Anne Duffy; A poetic tale of a Princess who could not be warmed by anything on the Earth until shown love. We have written our own versions using it as inspiration as one of our independent writing pieces.




Excitingly we have been engaged in two different projects for DT and for science. We are all entering a cross-school competition to build the strongest paper bridge and learning the science behind the strength properties of our materials.

In mathematics, we have been applying our knowledge of length and measure and have begun using rulers to accurately measure and draw to the nearest cm. What a jam packed schedule of learning!

Year 3



Year 3 have been loving Art. We have been looking closely at shapes within shapes and have drawn some careful drawings of drink cans and last week made fish out of wire! It was great to see the children persevere and helping one another out. We are really impressed by all of the children's fish and know that they are all desperate to take them home.



In English, we have spent two weeks looking at a book called 'The Dark' by Lemony Snicket. The children looked closely at the language used and wrote their own suspense story based upon the Dark. Some English work, from Beech and Pine class, was shown to teachers from other schools, who were very impressed. We think that we may have some authors in the making!

During mathematics lessons, the children have been measuring lengths and working out how to find the perimeter of shapes. They have become experts at converting between metres, centimetres and millimetres.

Year 3 Gymnastics Festival at Nuneaton Gymnastics Club

On Friday the 11th March, 10 pupils from year 3 were chosen to attend a School Games Gymnastics Festival, where they were competing against other schools from the local area. They had to perform a floor and vault routine and we were delighted with the result!

Year 4

We have had a fun-filled few weeks learning all about where the Anglo-Saxons came from in our humanities lessons.


In English, we have been exploring Beowulf, an old Anglo-Saxon tale - why not ask someone in year 4 to describe Grendel to you? The children have also begun to build self-propelling cars in design and technology using elastic bands and have been thinking about air resistance when designing the exterior.

In science year 4 are building steady-hand games using their knowledge of circuits, insulators and conductors as well as their creativity in shaping the wire and designing the base. The games are all looking fab and we can't wait to test them out!

We also celebrated science week earlier this month by analysing some prehistoric poo followed by a gripping assembly by Mr Payne using forensic science to investigate who stole Mr Thornton's favourite cup. The chief suspect was a little too close to year 4 for our liking!

Year 5

Year 5 have been having so much fun in science this month. During science week, we had a thrilling forensic investigation assembly with Mr Payne and then spent some time exploring 'making memories'. We learnt that our brains control everything we think, feel, say and do! When we learn something new, neurons in the brain make new connections, like a game of pass the parcel.



We have also been working on an exciting STEM project! After learning all about propelled cars, we got into small groups and designed our own. Over the next few weeks, we will be collecting materials to create our very own propelled cars.

Year 6

Year 6 are having great fun in History learning about the ancient Maya. We have also been practising writing formal complaints, using some great cohesive conjunctions and always remembering to be polite and factual. The next few pieces of English work will be based around the "Marwell Manor Mystery", where we will be using inference and deduction to write a formal detective report and an exciting and suspenseful narrative. With less than 30 school days left before our SATs tests, as you can imagine, we are going "all guns blazing" to prepare the children for these important assessments, although we do intend having fun too, whilst we revise the curriculum.

On this subject, while we all want our children to perform to their best, we also want them to stay calm and not get overly worried. The best preparation for the tests, apart from remembering to do their homework, is to eat healthily, get a good night's sleep and, most importantly, to have a positive attitude. If you would like your child to do any additional revision, there are plenty of good resources online to help, just type in "Key Stage 2 SATs practice" in your search engine of choice and you will find lots of helpful materials - I would particularly recommend the BBC Bitesize website, looking at grammar, maths and reading.

Science Week

For this year's science week, children at St Pauls have engaged in lots scientific ideas from nature walks, treasure hunts to excavating ancient poo! This year we focussed on getting excited for science and understanding science can be found behind everything we do. We counted taste buds using food colouring, used salt dough to show conductivity, explored aerodynamics making gliders and used chemical reactions to create colour changes! What a range of experiments. I hope all the children had lots of fun, we even all took part in the mystery of the stolen mug! Mr Thornton's favourite mug had gone missing and through forensic science we managed to catch Miss Atkinson red handed. Please use this as an opportunity to engage your child in scientific ideas at home, we are looking to relaunch our photography competition ready for the next term along with hosting a science evening for families to attend on top of our very exciting STEM challenge competitions. Let's hope St Pauls can win.


British Science Week 2022

During our first week back after Easter, we will be taking part in a Skills Builder Challenge Day, that aims to utilise all 8 of the essential skills. The challenge is called, "Level Up," where the children have to create a computer game that celebrates their local community. Not only will this enhance the 8 essential skills, but it will build on the tremendous Courageous Advocacy work that we strive for at St. Paul's - throughout the Challenge Day, we will be asking the children how they think we can improve our local community so it is the best it can be, and incorporating that into our game. Shakespeare Week

During the week beginning 21st March, the children took part in Shakespeare Week! St. Paul's are proud associates of the Royal Shakespeare Company which means our teachers get access to the very rehearsal room techniques that the RSC use when practising a play before it hits the stage. We then use the same strategies with the children to show them the works of Shakespeare! From tragedy, to romance, to comedy, each year group has a dedicated play which they study so by the time they leave St Paul's, they have a whole knowledge bank of Shakespearean plays up their sleeve! The supply role will not commence until all pre-employment checks have been made. If you are interested in this position, please pick up a job application form from the school office.



Free School Meals

3Pupils in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 are automatically eligible for a free school dinner under the Universal Free School Meals initiative launched by the government a few years ago.

Even if your child is in receipt of a universal free school dinner (Reception, Year 1 or Year 2) or in Nursery or in Years 3-6, if you are in receipt of any of the below benefits, please still apply by calling free schools meals on 01926 359189 as the school will receive funding to help your child.

- income support
- income-based Jobseeker's Allowance (JSA)
- income-related employment and support allowance (ESA)
- guarantee element of state pension credit
- Universal Credit (with an annual income of less than £7,400)
- Both income-based and contribution-based JSA/ESA if you receive the same amount for both. You should also qualify if you receive both, but the income-based amount is greater, but not if the contribution-based amount is greater.
- Families who are awarded Child Tax Credit and have an annual income assessed by HMRC to be no more than £16,190, providing there is no entitlement to Working Tax Credit (unless in respect of a 4-week 'run-on').

When eligibility has been confirmed by the school, you will receive a £25 uniform voucher per child.
